Course Description

As one of the major world religions, Buddhism originated in India but has since become an important cultural heritage shared by most, if not all, Asian societies up to the 11th century CE. Its influence can be seen in most Asian countries, as well as in Europe and North America, where elements of Buddhism have become popular in the public sphere and in professional sectors such as psychotherapy, neuroscience and education. This introductory course provides an overview of Buddhist intellectual and social history spanning over 2500 years, covering several geographical regions and aspects of the Buddhist religion. Topics include historical traditions, scriptures, fundamental doctrines, basic ethical ideas, practices and customs.

Objectives:

- 1. To give a general introduction to historical and geographical dimensions of Buddhism.
- 2. To introduce cultures of the three living Buddhist traditions.
- 3. To introduce the general features of Buddhist literature
- 4. To outline the fundamental teachings of Buddhist traditions.

Learning outcomes:

- 1. Gain a solid understanding of the differences between the most important traditions of Buddhist practice and thought.
- 2. Recognise the foundational doctrines of Buddhism and related contemplative practices.
- 3. Make sense of important Buddhist activities in contemporary settings
- 4. Gain an appreciation of Buddhist institutions and the most important genres of canonic Buddhist literature.

Further Notes

- 1. There is one **quiz** with 15 multiple choice questions. You only select the answer you think is correct out of the four options provided (eg.: What is a bhikkhu? A, a religious mendicant; B, a priest; C, a nun; D, a deity). You need to use either your laptop or your hand phone, which is accessible to Moodle as the Quiz is done online via the Moodle course page during a given period of time. Please DON'T miss it, as no make-up test will be arranged.
- 2. The **Short Essay** (300-500 words) requires you to provide a criticism or defense of ONE piece of Buddhist doctrines. Alternatively, you can choose to submit five questions on a Buddhist scripture (see the Long Essay).
- 3. The **Long Essay** (1800-2100) is a brief study of a Buddhist scripture selected from DN, MN, SN, AN, and KN, which can be found at https://www.accesstoinsight.org/ (under 'TIPITAKA'). Make sure to include all necessary bibliographic information about the selected scripture. To write this paper, you must consult at least five different academic publications.
- 4. Use any citation style you are familiar with, but be consistent and provide page numbers. Your essays must be double-spaced with a font size of 12, and should be submitted through 'turnitin' on the Moodle by the deadlines. The acceptable maximum similarity rate is 10%, excluding footnotes/endnotes and reference list/bibliography.
- 5. The grading principles are as follows: B-range grades are for basically good writing, including, clear structure and reasonable argumentation; generally correct understanding of Buddhist teachings (weighing 75% of the grade); readability in language (10%), acceptable technical matters (15%) (e.g. a title page, reference, and other conventions). The A-range grades are for writing that is excellent in all the above aspects.
- 6. There will be penalty for late submissions: 1) submission within the first 7 days after the deadline will result in a deduction of one sub-grade (e.g. $A \Rightarrow A$ -); 2) after the 8th day following the deadline, the deduction will be a full grade (e.g. $A \Rightarrow B$); 3) any submission made two weeks after the deadline will only receive a passing grade. Late submission should be sent to my email inbox.
